

The Chatterbox Project

Lead Artist and Producer 2013

The Chatterbox Project was created working collaboratively with the pupils from Milton Hall; one of Southend's most culturally diverse primary schools.

The project brought a public awareness to the school's thirty-eight spoken mother tongue languages by producing a large-scale sound installation to showcase at Metal's 2013 Village Green Festival. The festival was attended by over 20,000 visitors.

Selected pupils participated in creative workshops at the school before recording individual 'sound bites' in their mother tongue language which related to their favourite things about Southend.

Covered brought together two disparate groups from our society - older people living with dementia from Longfield Care Home in Maldon and young pregnant women already mothers with toddlers from a nearby young mothers group.

Through workshops at the care home, the participants created a 6 x 4 ft contemporary patchwork quilt together using a selection of Ghanaian batiks. The workshops became a space to meet, chat, create, laugh, share, remember, connect, collaborate and above all challenge the negative stereotypes of young and older people.

NetPark Education Programme

Artist Workshop Facilitator 2015


Appointed by Metal to work with Year 5 pupils from Thorpe Greenways Junior and Milton Hall Primary School to facilitate the development of the visuals and narratives to create two digital story Apps for NetPark. The Apps use geomapping technology for users to experience the stories around Chalkwell Park in Southend. The completed stories, *The Epic of Scentopia* and *Cake Work* were two of the five inaugural story Apps produced for the NetPark project launch in October 2015.

Pupils worked with a mixture of traditional materials and iPads to gradually develop an understanding of narrative set in the park. This creative media process employed core skills of literacy, visual thinking and group work.
















Clockwise from left: Cake Work App illustrating session; Cake Work App iPad session; Epic of Scentopia App characters workshop



Changing Face of the Rise

Changing Face of the Rise was a programme of creative community engagement consultation commissioned by Thurrock Council to engage with the residents who live on Seabrooke Rise estate in Grays going through a major housing regeneration programme.


The community engagement consultation was carried out in July 2015 at Village Beach Festival located just two minutes away from the estate. To ensure the engagement was accessible to the widest number of residents, five interactive activities were devised; each targeted towards different age groups that required varying levels of participation.

HenPower Southend

Artist Workshop Facilitator 2016

HenPower is a nationwide award-winning project that creatively engages older people living with dementia in arts activities and hen-keeping to promote health and wellbeing and reduce loneliness.

Appointed by Equal Arts, two-hour creative workshop sessions were delivered to residents living at Nazareth House and St Martins Care homes in Southend.

The Garden of Remember

Project Development and Lead Artist 2016-17

An NHS England commission for Southend Borough Council to devise and lead a workshop programme to develop a Dementia Awareness App working with NetPark virtual digital platform.


The App involves sharing stories and the experiences of two older men who live with dementia, with a small group of primary school pupils and disadvantaged young people.


The workshops included dementia awareness training; working with digital drawing software for iPads and professional microphones; as well as working with a professional writer and illustrator. Overall the workshops employed core skills of literacy, visual thinking, collaborative and intergenerational working. The App was published in February 2017.

HenPower Hackney

Associate Artist 2017 to 2018

The Huddleston Centre enables children and young people with special needs living in Hackney to take maximum control of their own lives and play a full and active role in all aspects of the community.

Appointed by the Huddleston Centre, weekly sessions are delivered for young people to engage in a wide range of creative activities in addition to caring for their hen lodgers through provision supported by national award-winning project, HenPower.

Open Arts

Artist-led Workshops 2017

Open Arts is a charitable community arts and mental health project managed by Essex Partnership University NHS Foundation Trust.


Appointed by Open Arts, this was a six-week wellbeing programme of creative art workshops aimed specifically for Muslim women living in and around Basildon, Essex.

The group worked with theme of identity, and using a range of collage techniques were encouraged to create bold and ambitious self-portraits. The portraits were exhibited at the Towngate Theatre, Basildon in November 2017.









Start

Artist-led Workshops 2017


Start is a UK-wide programme that aims to reach children who are missing out on a creative and cultural education. Start gives children in disadvantaged circumstances access to high-quality arts experiences that increase their confidence, boost their self-esteem and raise their aspirations over a three-year period.

Appointed by Focal Point Gallery workshops reference the gallery's current exhibition and offsite programme to consider the philosophies and working methods of the artist(s). Practical sessions combine hands-on digital activities and public screenings.




ROYAL OPERA HOUSE BRIDGE

Artist-led Workshop 2017


Appointed by Open Arts to devise and facilitate an art workshop to celebrate Black History Month for the residents of Basildon.

The workshop challenged participants to reproduce 50 drawings depicting 50 notable black Britons from throughout history to today. The drop-in style workshop, which attracted a range of participants from aged 5 to 75, also became a cultural learning zone as participants gained knowledge about the person they portrayed.

The 50 drawings were exhibited with a collection of other *Open Arts* artworks at the Towngate Theatre, Basildon in November 2017.














The Digital 'Selfie' Portrait
